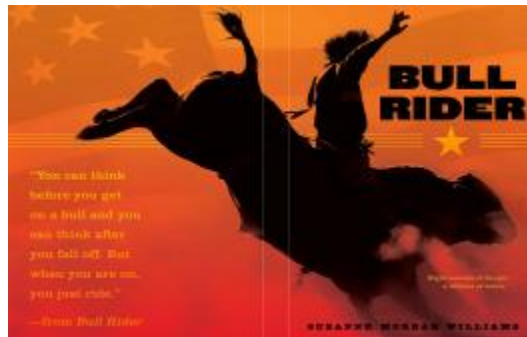

There is nothing more moving about a story than knowing it is true – whether that truth is in the actual events, in the details that lead us to believe it, or in a deeper human place of emotional resonance. There is no better teacher, no more straightforward way to make a point than with a story. Through stories, students become readers and writers. They remember. And they share.

Suzanne Morgan Williams is author of both fiction and non-fiction books for children. Her work has taken her to Mexico, the Arctic, backstage at the rodeo, and to teaching wigwams on Indian reservations. She's been stranded on the sea ice on Hudson Bay and dodged a bull's horns as he tried to climb out of a chute. Suzanne watches and listens – then she weaves facts into fiction or uncovers the real story in a non-fiction project.

Suzanne is a former teacher and frequent presenter in schools, libraries, museums, and to conference groups. She uses visuals, interaction, and her own stories to draw her audience into a place where detail, experience, and emotion blend to create one story that needs to be told.

Programs and Presentations

Fact in Fiction: Grades 4 and up: How do research, interviews, travel and site visits, storytelling and personal experience work together in creating fiction? For large groups Suzanne includes a power point presentation, student interaction, and plenty of stories and examples as well as sharing from her work. She emphasizes skills students already have that will help them create their own stories.

Grades K-3: Suzanne shares stories she has learned in her research and integrates age appropriate activities to hold your students' interest. Plenty of visuals too.

For groups smaller groups: up to sixty participants she can include some hands on activities – such as practicing interviewing skills, writing a group story, or using personal experience to create the building blocks for their own stories.

The Story Behind Bull Rider: Middle school and high school students learn about researching the facts behind Bull Rider. Suzanne talks about the sacrifices service

people and their families make and she challenges students to support our injured veterans. A lesson in research, civics, and literature.

Suzanne also talks to students about their own unique stories that only they are qualified to tell. She encourages them to become both readers and writers
